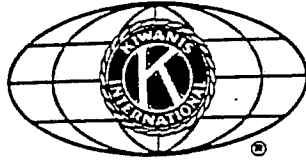

INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION - LAS VEGAS
AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

Approved:

Amendment to the Bylaws to allow all Kiwanis clubs the option of holding a minimum of two regular meetings per month.

Amendment to the Bylaws to eliminate the Conference on Nominations to allow the House of Delegates at an International Convention to vote on all nominees for the Kiwanis International Board of Trustees.

Amendment to the Bylaws to allow members of active Kiwanis clubs to transfer membership from one club to another.

RESOLUTIONS

Approved:

1. Kiwanis: Oneness In Diversity

A resolution whereby: 1) Kiwanis International, its federations, districts, clubs, and individual members, give careful thought to the programs and practices espoused, so that there is an awareness of and a sensitivity to the ethnic, cultural, and religious diversity of the world and the communities in which we live. 2) We continue to embrace the six permanent Objects of Kiwanis as a caring and understanding organization that seeks to offer the Kiwanis experience to many diverse people, all of whom share our ideals.

2. Worldwide Service Project -- A Time For Action

A resolution in which: 1) Every Kiwanis member make a personal commitment to participate by contributing to the Worldwide Service Project fund through the appropriate foundation. 2) Every Kiwanis club make a commitment to develop a special fund-raising project to support the Worldwide Service Project. 3) Every Kiwanian and every Kiwanis club commit to seeking financial support for the Worldwide Service Project from individuals, businesses, corporations, and other community entities. 4) Kiwanians of the world continue to provide financial support until the goal of virtually eliminating Iodine Deficiency Disorders is achieved.

3. Preserving A Free Society

A resolution in which every Kiwanis club: 1) Affirm its support of the rule of law in society, urging all of its members to set examples within each community as law-abiding citizens. 2) Give full and wholehearted support to law enforcement officials, offering its cooperation and assistance to combat crime and lawlessness. 3) Make a dedicated effort, through its members, to become involved in the preservation of law and order within its community, educating citizens, particularly youth, in the importance of the fundamental requirement of the rule of law in a free society. 4) And its members become actively involved in eliminating crime through support of community efforts and programs directed toward that important goal.

4. Young Children: Priority One -- Working In A Partnership

A resolution in which every Kiwanis club: 1) Expand current projects that help young children in order to address the needs of more children. 2) Seek out existing child-serving groups within their communities as potential partners with the expertise to augment the club's own resources. 3) Create a partnership project for young children that involves other Kiwanis clubs and organizations that serve young children. 4) Make its local community aware of the needs of young children by conducting a field trip project for club members and community leaders.

5. Membership Retention -- A Priority

A resolution whereby all Kiwanis clubs create an atmosphere that: 1) Promotes quality fellowship and unity of clubs through members' concern and appreciation for each other. 2) Links members' skills and talents with opportunities to serve the club and the community. 3) Enhances the members' knowledge and appreciation of Kiwanis International activities at all levels. 4) Places a renewed emphasis on making every member a "Kiwanian," rather than just a member, giving priority to the retention of members.

6. Sponsored Youth

A resolution that: 1) Kiwanis clubs and Kiwanians continue to provide support and leadership to our sponsored youth groups through the implementation of joint K-Family service projects. 2) Kiwanis clubs give priority to the expansion of the Sponsored Youth Family wherever possible.
