




First Year Letter

Sept 18–20, 2001



School Breakfast Program Begins a New Year

The beginning of the 2001-'02 school year saw the resumption of breakfast programs in six of Janesville's Elementary Schools. Our Kiwanis Club provided eleven volunteers, and in some cases other family members, to prepare and serve breakfast in three schools. In August and September, our volunteers were responsible for 107.5 hours of volunteer time to make the program a success.

The average number of students eating breakfast each day in the schools our members are working in so far this year is 71. Financial support for the program comes from private organizations, individuals and churches. Our Kiwanis Club donates to all six breakfast programs each year. No school district funds, state or federal funds are used to support this increasingly needed program.


